

THE PTNS PATHWAY

HOW DOES URGENT® PC WORK?

The Urgent PC Neuromodulation System is indicated for the treatment of Overactive Bladder and associated symptoms of urinary urgency, urinary frequency and urge incontinence. Urgent PC provides indirect stimulation to the sacral nerve plexus via the tibial nerve, a mixed sensory-motor nerve that runs from spinal roots L4 to S3 to innervate the bladder and urethral sphincter. One obvious benefit of Urgent PC therapy is that the tibial nerve is easily accessible in the lower leg, ensuring a low risk procedure.

TIBIAL NERVE PATHWAY TO SACRAL PLEXUS






- Stimulation travels from the point of entry near the ankle, up the tibial nerve and to the Sacral Plexus
- Innervates bladder and urethral sphincter
- Easily accessible nerve


SACRAL PLEXUS

The Sacral Plexus provides nerves for the pelvis and lower limbs.



INNERVATION OF THE BLADDER

The bladder is innervated by a combination of sympathetic and parasympathetic nerves. The pudendal nerve provides external sphincter control.




MECHANISM OF ACTION

It is believed that PTNS:

- Involves specific receptors in the spinal cord which contribute to the effectiveness of neuromodulation¹
- Induces neural plasticity in the CNS^{1, 2}
- Influences signals from and towards the bladder via the sacral plexus by retrograde afferent stimulation¹
- Activates somatosensory afferent fibers¹
